Oviatt House is grateful to highlight the contributions of volunteer Clive Fetzer, who was interviewed for this first edition of our Volunteer Spotlight.

When did you first become involved with Oviatt House? For a number of years, the historic Oviatt house was left abandoned and greatly neglected. The prospect of successfully restoring the 1836 homestead seemed unlikely. I became involved with the project in April of 2022 when I began to see earnest activity taking place by dedicated volunteers in need of additional dedicated volunteers. My involvement is something I have never regretted.

What inspired you to become involved with the Oviatt House project? My inspiration to become involved and stay involved for as many years as will be required, came from the people with whom I am volunteering. It became immediately apparent that the men and women of Oviatt House, Inc. believed in what they were doing. They had a vision of what Oviatt House could once more become. They were and are dedicated to preserving the heritage and history of the Oviatt family and their ties to the Underground Railroad. Their vision became my vision, their commitment, my commitment.

What do you enjoy most about volunteering at Oviatt House? What I enjoy most about volunteering at Oviatt House is that I can witness progress taking place. I enjoy that every day is different and presents new skills to be learned. I enjoy the guidance and fellowship I receive from the people I work with. For anyone thinking of volunteering, you couldn't ask for a better crew.

What skills and talents help you the most while volunteering? Showing up at the Oviatt House with relatively few skills and talents, I think I benefitted most from my ability to listen, and my willingness to learn. I am not certain I have developed any talents, but I have learned a lot of skills. If I have talents, they would be to enjoy the people I work with, enjoy doing something worthwhile, and taking an interest in the history we are bringing back to life from an abandoned shell of a house.

What would you like the supporters of Oviatt House to know about your background? I believe that the most important thing for people to know about my background is that I had no background. I showed up with a hammer, and the crew put me to work, teaching me everything I know today about restoration and reconstruction. Professionally, I worked as a sterile processing tech in the OR at the Cleveland Clinic. Today I am a volunteer, still learning and honing my skills at the Oviatt House. What this tells me is that anyone can follow their vision and dedicate themselves to something meaningful that can benefit from their willingness to learn.

When not volunteering, what do you like to do? I like hiking, photography, birdwatching, studying the biodiversity of the plant and animal kingdoms, and walking my dog, Echo. So, for me all of those things come together at the Richfield Heritage Preserve. When I am not at the Oviatt House, I am frequently somewhere in the park pursuing my interests, and enjoying the changes which each season brings to the historic property that I know well.

Restoration Front



Over the winter months, a small but dedicated crew has been working hard at a number of jobs at the Oviatt house. Much time has been spent tediously stripping away the layers of paint from doors and trim. Additionally, several key areas were prepared to showcase the construction techniques common in 1836. In the back room, a space was framed out to create the beginning of a storage closet. On the second floor, several areas with damaged floor boards were repaired with century-old flooring that was generously donated to us! All small steps toward our larger restoration goal!

Museum Development

Thanks to a grant from the Network to Freedom and Association for the Study of the African American Life and History, funded by the 400 Years of African American History Commission, we are collecting historical information to compile a Reference Library that will be used as the foundational framework for exhibit planning. The grant covers research related costs and includes a stipend for University of Akron student interns enrolled in the Museum and Archives Certificate Program. We have made a lot of progress and work with our first intern is almost complete!






2023 Annual Report Released
